Schools or beekeepers under 18 years of age can put their beehives to the test with the Junior Beekeeper Liquid Honey class. The competition is a great way to teach children about bees and keep the industry buzzing by getting the next generation involved. Judging of the Apiculture Competition takes place in the lead-up to Show on Saturday 3 August in the Royal International Convention Centre at 10am.

The popular Arts and Cookery competitions have this year over 5,000 entries across eight sections (listed above). Queensland's Best Dark Rich Fruit Cake will be judged live on the Royal Queensland Cooking stage presented by Saveful in the Woolworths Fresh Food Pavilion on 13 August at 3pm. The judges will be comparing the top three fruit cakes entered into the Ekka against the top three winners from Queensland Ag Shows to see who takes home the \$500 prize money and coveted title as baker of Queensland's Best Dark Rich Fruit Cake. This is the first time both competitions will feed into the one major competition, in the ultimate battle of City vs Country.

Bakers of chocolate caramel slice and raspberry coconut slice will get a

'slice' of the action with these new categories added to the 2024 Royal Queensland Show competition. There is a spook-tacular opportunity to get creative with Halloween-Style Pumpkin being the 2024 Cake Decorating Theme. Also new to the schedule is a new Buttercream class in the Cake Decorating Competition.

This year the flavours of the Sunshine State will be bottled up with ABC Radio Brisbane's Queensland in a Jar class. The competition will focus on finding the state's best preserve – be it relish, chutney or jam, just as long as the main ingredient is grown in Queensland. The classes will be judged at the ABC Broadcast Tent, located on the Ground Floor of the Royal International Convention Centre on Monday 12 August at 1.30pm. There will be prizes for first, second and third in the ABC Listeners' Choice and similarly for Class 3 which is open to ABC staff who will be submitting their jam in a jar entry.

The Natural Fibres Make & Model competition will be heading back to the 80s for the Senior School Class. Expect to see shoulder pads, bubble skirts and jumpsuits on display as entrants repurpose materials to make an outfit representing the fashion of the 1980s. Meanwhile the Queensland Ag Shows Adult Recycle and Re-Create class will be taking on a Goth theme in 2024.

The sky is the limit for the Wearable Art Competition, with the 2024 theme being Your Imagination. In the Natural Fibres Make & Model and Wearable Art Competition, aspiring designers of all ages will showcase their latest creations which will be paraded on the Main Stage on Saturday 12 August at 3.30pm.

This year in the Creative Art and Craft Competition, the Teddy Bears will now be joined by Furry Friends, with the category expanding to creations of both. Additional changes in 2024 include ceramics and pottery will be combined in the one competition and China Painting being rebranded as Porcelain Art.

A record number of entries in Cake Decorating, Cookery, Creative Art and Craft, Painting and Drawing, Photography and Sculpture will be on display in the Channel 7 Pavilion from 9am to 7pm over the nine days of Show. In the Natural Fibres Make & Model and Wearable Art competitions, aspiring designers of all ages will showcase their latest creations. There are new 1970s fashion era and steam punk themes, plus the Adults in Wool class showcasing items made from 100 per cent wool fabrics.

The prize pool for showjumping has increased to an incredible \$75,000. Thanks to presenting partner Queensland Off-The-Track (QOTT) Program, there will be \$50,000 on offer for showjumpers who can clear 1.2m, with \$25,000 allocated for entrants who clear the junior jump height of 1.05m, with both categories paying down to 30th place. To be staged in the Main Arena, these events will be exclusively held for retired racehorses as part of QOTT's Program to promote life after racing opportunities for retired racehorses.

Meanwhile more than 15 breeds of horses from small Shetland Ponies to huge Clydesdales will be showcased over seven days of judging (Monday 12 to Sunday 18 August) in the Horse Competition. The children's competition classes of Child's Show Pony Galloway & Hack and Child's Show Hunter Galloway & Hack are back after their successful introduction in 2023. Four of the classes have been updated this year, with participation open to all riders.

Thoroughbred and Standardbred Day will be held on Monday 12 August. It's a race day style event where the two versatile racing breeds will compete for the sought-after Champion of their Breed Title. The Fashions on the Field Competition presented by Brisbane Racing Club is also held on this day, with entrants wearing their most stylish formal spring season race wear. Paddock to Palate

This year, the prestigious supply chain competition Paddock to Palate offered almost \$55,000 in prize money. Held in Toowoomba on 18 June, the competition attracted 798 head of cattle – up from 756 head in 2023. The 100-day Paddock to Palate Competition winners exclusively go to the JBS Royal 100 Brand and the 70-day winning cattle form part of the JBS Queenslander brand. In addition, beef producers in the competition collect valuable data to benchmark their cattle and boost their business.

Now in its 27th year, the RNA's Paddock to Palate Competition presented by JBS Australia now moves into the second phase which is carcass judging. Competition classes 37, 38 and 40 are three phased comprising best aggregate weight gain, carcass and MSA eating quality, while the Wagyu Challenge is four phased finishing in a beef taste off judged by some of Queensland's top chefs. The exhibitors who poll the highest aggregate scores across all phases of the four classes will be awarded the overall prizes at the Paddock to Palate and Beef Industry Dinner presented by JBS Australia at the Brisbane Showgrounds on Thursday 8 August. *Gary Noller (RNA Councillor in Charge) T 0408 700 949*
